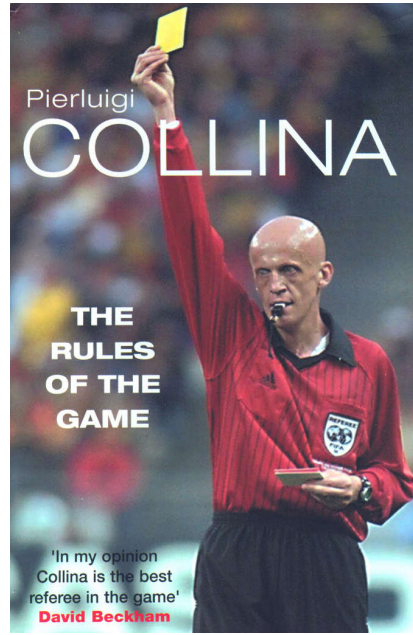

How the top referee in the world feels about belonging to a Referee's Association



How important does Collina feel belonging to a Referees Association is?
The following are excerpts from Collina's new book

" I have spent many evenings (with my Referee's Association)... These were important times because we could recount our experiences and exchange opinions, which was useful for training and development, especially for the younger referees. It's not only out on the pitch that one learns and improves, but also in absorbing other people's experiences. This kind of training means that, rather than seeing certain situations out on the pitch, you see them in your mind."

" By hosting referees' informal meetings, the branch transforms itself into a club and becomes something more than the place where the technical meetings take place - the meetings in which we talk and discuss the rules, analyse various interpretations and consider technical aspects of the game. Aside from these official meetings, almost all of the branches have recreational activities, from card games to dinners - all of which brings cohesion to the group and gives each referee a sense of being part of a larger society."

B.C. Soccer Referees Association (BCSRA).

What is the BC Soccer Referees Association (BCSRA)?

The BCSRA is a collection of referees from around the province dedicated to bringing referees together in order to help raise the status quo of refereeing and ensure referees issues are addressed. It is the defacto voice of referees with members coming from all ranks; from Class 4 to FIFA, including referees, instructors, and assessors.

What does the Referees Association do?

The BCSRA is an organization whose whole reason for being is to act as a support/social group for referees. It nurtures new recruits into refereeing and helps its members with problems in the art of refereeing. In so doing the BCSRA creates a common bond amongst fellow referees, and makes sure that referees are not forgotten in discussions on the future of the sport. This is all done by forming Area Associations which look after local concerns, electing a band of spokespeople.

How is the BCSRA connected?

We have Area Associations across the province including Fraser Valley, Kamloops, Prince George, Vancouver Area and Vancouver Island. Efforts are being made with referees in Kelowna and Williams Lake to form new area associations in those regions. The BCSRA is a founding member of the Canadian Soccer Referees Association and an associate member of the BC Soccer Association and many of our members are either BC Soccer-certified instructors/assessors, or sit on their referee-associated committees or are schedulers/adminstrators in various leagues.

INFORMATION NOTES:

BCSRA membership year runs May 1st to April 30th for members in the Interior; October 1st to September 30th for Coastal members. New applicants joining during last 3 months of current membership year for their region pay full fee and will be considered members for those months plus the following 12 month membership year. New Class 3, 2, and 1 applicants who join in the last 4-6 months of the current membership year pay only half price and required to renew for full fee at the start of the next membership year. Associate members are those who have retired from active refereeing and wish to support and be involved in the Referees Association.

NOTE: Registering with BCSRA does not place you on the BC Soccer Association Official List of Referees and therefore does not give you the license-to-referee. It is BCSRA policy that you must register with BC Soccer in order to both referee and be placed on that Official List. REMIINDER: one must complete a sanctioned BC Soccer Refresher Course before you are eligible to renew your Referee License with the BC Soccer Association and allow you to continue refereeing. No Refresher Course is needed to join/renew with the Referees Association. If you are unclear about whether you are on the Official List or whether you must take a Refresher Course please check with the BC Soccer office by calling 604-299-6401

It is the goal of the B. C. Soccer Referees' Association to have every soccer referee in B. C. under the banner of the Referees' Association. Having all referees properly affiliated with a local area association or, as a last resort, having individual members register as direct members must have a positive influence upon the game.

As a member of the BCSRA and especially as a member of a local Area Association, the individual has a forum to present his/her thoughts, concerns, and ideas relating on all refereeing matters, including the provincial development of referees. Membership in a Referee's Association provides an opportunity to get together on a regular basis to discuss common areas of concern and to become actively involved in refereeing matters at a local or provincial level. Membership allows the referee to be involved in advanced educational sessions, and in some areas, regularly scheduled training sessions. Association activities, whether business or social, allow all soccer people the opportunity to get to know us as we really are and not just as we appear in our role as referee. Behind every successful person is a network of people that helped him get there. We all get by with a little help from our friends. This is what a Referees Association is all about. The Referees Association allows officials to come into a setting to rub shoulders with those that know what is going on in their minds, to feed off each other's energy, and to invigorate the passion we all have for the game.

For the good of the game, we as referees must be united, strive for excellence, and display at all times a positive approach toward the game. With this attitude, we can assist the individual to strive for consistency rather than personal gain.

Lastly, the BCSRA encourages referees to come together all across the province and form local chapters under the Referee Associaton banner. It is our duty as referees to leave our fraternity in a better situation than when we inherited it. The BCSRA welcomes all referees to come together and continue the work that others have started.
